Learning is in full swing as classes have established routines and expectations. This year, we are focusing on literacy and math as foundational skills. In support of these academic goals, we are also wanting students to feel connected to two or more adults in the building and will also be looking at student resilience (both academically with a growth mindset, and also the ability to handle disappointment when obstacles are encountered or things don't go the way they would have hoped). Each month, we will update you in the newsletter about what we are working on and how you can support this at home with your child. We hope that these ideas are stress-free and easy to do and will support your child's learning.

School goals:

Writing: This year, we continue to focus on developing student's writing abilities. There are many things that you can do at home to help your child develop their writing skills. There are many ways of supporting writing skills that don't involve actually writing things on paper. A strategy often used in classrooms to get started with writing is to talk about an idea (whether it's what happened on the weekend or earlier in the day or what a person ate for breakfast). Writing often flows from an ability to talk about something (given that writing is the next step of putting our thoughts on paper). To support this, having regular conversations with your child is invaluable. Back-and-forth verbal exchanges between child and adult are powerful for strengthening children's language skills. As you have that back-and-forth conversation with your child, ask lots of questions (Who? What? When? Where? Why?) so that they can tell about it as much as they can. This will grow their ideas of things to talk (and write) about and their stamina to tell more.

Numeracy: Our continued focus this year for developing math skills for all students is on understanding grade-level appropriate critical concepts and the application through problem solving. One of the biggest influences in how successful you are with math is attitude. Believing that we can persevere and work through hard things is so important. As part of our schoolwide

focus on math we are continuing a problem-solving challenge that will begin this month. Each month, we will have 3-4 problems for students to solve. Some will solve these in class, and others will be brought home to solve together with family. It is important to note that these problems are designed to make students really think and not rely on generating an equation right away to solve the problem. Most will involve needing to draw a picture or a diagram to support their strategy for figuring out the answer. This is an excellent way to solve problems! Please encourage your child to try these problems, and to draw pictures to help them. This will be an important strategy all the way through the grades. Our challenge this month is to have 100 students solve the problem of the month for October. Please watch for the problems coming home and make a family activity out of solving them!

What did teachers do for the Pro D day?

On September 29th, we focused on Social Emotional Learning (SEL) with time spent considering some of the information in the book <u>The Behavior Code</u> by Jessica Minihan and Nancy Rappaport. We also spent time in the garden with gardening expert Ken Salvail so that we could continue our understanding of how to use the garden as a learning space. There were different workshops throughout the district offered in the afternoon, but some continued the SEL learning from the morning, reviewing articles on co-regulating and Universal Design for Learning. It was a great day of learning!

Criminal Record Checks

If you would like to volunteer in any capacity in the school, you will need to complete a criminal record check online. This is a free process as costs are covered by the school district. Completed criminal record checks are good for five years.

Process:

1) Go to https://justice.gov.bc.ca/criminalrecordcheck

- 2) Enter the code **6TQTFUJGQP**
- 3) Follow the instructions for completing the online Criminal Record Check.
